2010-2011 SECURITY INFORMATION

Located in the resort community of Edinboro, Pennsylvania, the University is provided with a high degree of protection by the 14 officers of the University Police Department. Significant resources have been committed to ensure the safety and security of the students, staff and visitors to this 585-acre campus.

Police patrols and programs complement the efforts of various student affairs resources to ensure that a safe and secure learning environment is maintained at all times.

This pamphlet provides details on University policies and programs required by the College and University Security Information Act and the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act. Crime statistics for the previous three years are published on the University website at <http://www.edinboro.edu/departments/police/>. All prospective students and employees are directed to this location. This information will assure you that the Edinboro experience - in the classroom, residence hall and throughout the campus - will continue to be one which provides a feeling of personal safety and one which is rich academically, culturally and socially.

ENROLLMENT

Our residence halls house a total of 2,472 students, Fall semester enrollment of students living on campus was 2,080.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR POLICE/SECURITY

The Vice President for Finance and Administration has overall responsibility for police services and security on the Edinboro University Campus, Edinboro University in Erie - The Porreco Center and in Meadville.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Edinboro University Police Department employs 14 commissioned police officers who are all trained by the Pennsylvania State Police. The officers have all completed the Municipal Police Training Course. Additional training is provided on a continuing basis in a variety of subjects. Officers are responsible for enforcement of all the rules and regulations of the University as well as laws of the Commonwealth and United States.

AUTHORITY

All officers are commissioned by the Governor and have full police powers. The University Police are assisted by the state police in major incidents and investigations. As fully recognized, Municipal Police Officer Training and Education Commission (MPOTEC) Officers, statutory Mutual Aid exists between the University Police and the Borough of Edinboro Police Department. This empowers officers of either department to provide immediate aid to the other in the event of an emergency situation, back up or support. The University Police are in full compliance with the PA State UCR reporting requirements.

POLICE REPORTS

The Edinboro University Police take reports on all criminal incidents occurring on the Edinboro campus, The Porreco Center in Erie and our Meadville Campus.

Students and staff members are encouraged to report crimes and suspicious activities promptly to the University Police or local Jurisdiction. Crimes may also be reported to the Dean of Student Life, University Ombudsperson or the Director of Residence Life and Housing.

The Edinboro Police Department, The Millcreek Police Department, and The Meadville Police Department routinely submits reports of criminal activity and arrests of University students in their jurisdiction. These reports are reviewed by the President, Vice President for Vice President for Finance and for Vice President for Finance and Administration, and the Dean of Student Life and are referred to the Office of Student Judicial Affairs for action if deemed appropriate.

BUILDING ACCESS

All campus buildings are posted with signs indicating normal building hours. Keys have been issued to those employees who have a need for access after normal hours. Students may obtain an "after hours" pass to remain in a classroom building beyond normal hours if approved by the appropriate department chairperson. Buildings in the "fine arts quad" may be accessed by students during their non posted hours via a "fine arts quad" pass. The repair of locks and other security related problems is done on a priority basis.

CRIMES - EMERGENCIES

Criminal actions or emergencies may be reported directly to the Edinboro University Police Department. An emergency phone number, 2911, is posted

throughout the campus and is used to report emergencies that require the attention of the police, fire department or ambulance. In addition, approximately 80 emergency telephones located on various sidewalks, walkways and in buildings which are connected directly with the University Police.

The University Police investigate and make arrests as appropriate in criminal incidents that have been reported. The University Police desk officer notifies the West County Emergency Dispatch when a fire truck or ambulance is needed.

DISSEMINATING INFORMATION ON SERIOUS CRIMES - TIMELY NOTICE

When a serious crime has been reported and it is determined that students and staff members may be in danger of being victimized in the same manner and/or location, a timely warning or emergency notification may be issued. Students may be warned of danger through the E2Campus alert text messaging system. Students are encouraged to sign up for this service through the University Police web page (keyword search: *University Police*). Residence hall housing will also initiate a scroll announcement on the campus cable channels, and pop up notices will be sent out to anyone logged into the University intranet. A timely warning or emergency notification may be issued in the effected area of throughout the campus and also released to WFSE-FM the campus radio station and The Spectator, the campus newspaper, as a public service announcement if deemed appropriate. Incidents may be reported to the Dean of Students or Director of Residence Life as well as the Police.

ALCOHOL AND ILLEGAL DRUGS

Zero Tolerance Policy for Alcohol and Illegal Drugs -The University will not tolerate the use, possession, and/or distribution of alcohol or illegal drugs. These activities present a danger to the University community and detract from the educational mission of the institution. Students may be denied admittance into University facilities if it is believed they are under the influence of, or in possession of, alcohol or illegal drugs. Negative behavior that results from the use of alcohol and/or other drugs will not be tolerated in the University community. All instances of drug and alcohol usage will be investigated and if charges are warranted, charges will be filed by the University Police and formally adjudicated by the Office of Student Judicial Affairs. GUADENZIA Erie provides alcohol and substance abuse counseling at the health center, on the campus for students, staff and the local community. In addition, the residence hall staff is trained to deal with alcohol and substance abuse situations.

SEXUAL ASSAULT

The Crime Victim Center provides on-campus counseling for students, staff and the local community. Counseling for students is also available through Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS). The Residence Life and Housing Office provide staff training and programming on sexual assault.

Programming on dating and domestic violence is provided both on & off campus by a counselor from Safe Horizons, Inc. This individual also provides on-campus counseling services for students who may be victims or witnesses of violent relationships.

Edinboro University policy, "Sexual Assault" (A-059), details the options available to victims. They are encouraged to seek medical attention, report the crime to the University Police and preserve any and all physical evidence such as clothing worn at the time of assault. Do not bathe or shower prior to obtaining medical attention. University personnel will assist the victim to report the incident to the proper Police Jurisdiction.

If uncomfortable with reporting to the University Police, the incident may be reported to any official of the University such as the Office of Student Affairs and Student Success, Dean of Student Life, Student Judicial Affairs Office, a sexual violence victim advocate, a residence hall coordinator (RHC), counseling services or resident assistant (RA). But, in all cases, seeking medical attention is encouraged.

To maintain confidentiality, but still comply with the law to obtain an accurate account of all crimes, pastoral counselors and professional counselors are requested to forward only a verifiable statistic to the University Police. Statistic will be verified through the use of either a day and time of occurrence or location of occurrence. At all times, the victim's wishes as to police involvement will be followed.

The victim's academic and living situation may be changed if requested and if such changes are reasonably available. The student's academic advisor and the Residence Life and Housing Office can provide details as needed.

Both the accused and the victim may have other support persons present during a disciplinary hearing. Both will be advised of the outcome of that proceeding. Persons found guilty of sexual assault may be suspended or expelled from the University.

WEAPONS

Students may not keep firearms and/or other dangerous weapons in University housing facilities. Possession, transportation, improper storage or use of firearms, firecrackers, knives, explosives, weapons or any item which has been modified or adapted so that it can be used as a weapon is a violation of Pennsylvania State law and Edinboro University policy.

University Police carry firearms at all times when on duty. In addition to the training they receive from the Pennsylvania State Police during their basic training agenda, all officers must undergo firearms training at least once a year. Additionally, officers may be equipped with chemical mace, pepper spray, batons or expandable ASP batons.

CRIMINAL RECORDS

The University Police maintain records of students and non-students who are charged with criminal offenses. All requirements of the Criminal History, Records and Information Act are followed. Notification will be made to the Administration at any time a student or employee is determined to have a criminal record. Recommendations will be made to insure the security of the University.

CRIME PREVENTION

Cameras have been installed in common areas of some residence halls for additional security. Video obtained from the camera systems can be used for sanctions and/or possible prosecution of offenders. Plans include additional video surveillance cameras to be installed during the year to further increase security and the protection of students, employees and property. Several programs are aimed at reducing crime at Edinboro University.

Operation I-dent – Available year round

Engraving guns are available at all residence halls and at the University Police Office for marking personal property with the number from your operator's license. This will enable police anywhere to identify and return items to you should they be stolen.

Crime-Watch

All students and staff members are encouraged to watch for and report any suspicious activity to the University Police. Many crimes are prevented and many others are solved through information received from those who care enough to be "Crime-Watchers".

Crime Prevention Surveys

Surveys are conducted of all campus facilities to ensure that lights, windows, doors, landscaping and other items are in line with security requirements. These surveys are reviewed routinely to ensure that deficiencies are being corrected and that a high level of security is being maintained.

RAD (Rape Aggression Defense)

Members of the Student Life Staff and University Police Department teach RAD. The RAD System is a program of realistic self-defense tactics and techniques, including awareness, prevention, risk reduction, avoidance and the basics of hands-on defense training. RAD teaches students how to avoid situations that could potentially involve sexual assault and how to defend themselves should an assault occur.

Social Networking Classes

On a regular basis part of Residence Life & Housing RA programming, Police officers teach courses in Social Networking, Safety & Security and protecting one's self from Identity Theft.

COMMUNICATIONS

The campus newspaper regularly publishes details regarding criminal incidents on the University campus and the names of those persons who have been charged in criminal actions. Special articles are published regarding major incidents, crime prevention efforts, investigations and security matters. The University radio station routinely airs public service announcements on various crime prevention subjects. Safety tips and FAQ section are published on the University Police web page.

DRUG FREE SCHOOLS ACT COMPLIANCE

Edinboro University is in compliance with the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989. Required materials are mailed to every student, both on and off campus, full and part time, graduate and undergraduate. The materials are:

1. Student Code of Conduct that clearly prohibits the unlawful possession, use or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students on University property or as part of University activities.
2. A description of the applicable legal sanctions for the unlawful possession of illicit drugs and alcohol.
3. A description of the health risk associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol.
4. A description of drug and alcohol counseling, treatment and rehabilitation programs which are available to students.
5. A statement that the University will impose disciplinary sanctions on students (consistent with local, state and federal law) and a description of those sanctions up to and including expulsion and referral for prosecution, for violations of the Student Code of Conduct.

HOUSING INFORMATION

TYPES OF HOUSING

Edinboro University offers students double and private rooms in co-ed traditional & suite style buildings. Single gender floors and wings are available.

ASSIGNMENTS/CHANGES

Freshman students are assigned to rooms based upon their date of acceptance and their response to a questionnaire regarding their housing preferences. Every effort is made to honor a student's request for a specific housing assignment. A room change period is held at the beginning of each semester. Students may request a room change by contacting the residence life staff.

In the event of an emergency or extenuating situation, the Residence Life and Housing Office will provide an immediate change in a student's housing assignment. Students are reminded that they may request to have their name, local address and phone number withheld from all public student directories. Students wishing to request a public information hold should direct a written request to the Office of Records and Registration.

VISITORS/GUESTS TO RESIDENCE HALLS

From 9:00 p.m. until 6:00 a.m., all persons (students, non-students and resident students from other buildings) must show identification prior to entering a residence hall. Visitors must be escorted by their host at all times and guests must obey all residence hall rules and regulation. Escorts shall be responsible for the conduct of their guests.

Non-student guests, when class is in session may stay no more than two nights in a seven-day period and are required to abide by all University policies. The privilege to visit Edinboro University may be removed if a non-student guest violates University policies and procedures. All non-student guests, faculty in residence, Athletic and vocational camps are required to adhere to all University regulations.

SECURING ENTRANCES

All exterior doors, except the late night entrance, are locked at 9:00 p.m. daily. Residents are not permitted to enter or exit a residence hall except via the late night entrance from 9:00 p.m. until 6:00 a.m. daily. At 1:00 a.m. the late night entrance is secured, and residents will be admitted only after

showing a valid student I.D. Each residence hall is equipped with an alarm system that notifies desk personnel when someone has exited through a locked door. The staff on duty then checks to ensure that the door is secured. Students who violate the door policy are referred for disciplinary action.

ROOM SECURITY

While the specific type of hardware varies from building to building, each room is equipped with a door lock. All first floor windows have window latches. Students are encouraged to secure belongings by locking doors, leaving valuable items at home, and employing sound judgment regarding security of their belongings.

RESIDENCE HALL SECURITY

Resident assistants (RAs) are undergraduate employees who are assigned to supervise each wing/floor of the residence halls. Each residence hall is also assigned a live-in residence hall coordinator as well as an assistant residence hall coordinator. These staff members monitor the environment and activity within each building. Night receptionists are stationed at the lobby desk of each building from 1:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. daily.

All residence hall students share the responsibility to maintain a secure living environment. Securing room and entrance doors, reporting suspicious persons and notifying the staff of security problems are a part of that responsibility.

Each resident assistant and residence hall coordinator undergoes an extensive training program prior to their employment. The University Police assist in the training of the residence life staff and are available at any time to answer additional questions or assist the staff.

PROGRAMS

At their first floor meeting, the RAs discuss the Student Code of Conduct which includes policies and regulations designed to help ensure a safe and secure environment. In subsequent floor meetings, held periodically throughout the year, students are encouraged to participate in special programs such as Operation I-dent, Crime-Watch and other campus-wide programs and workshops.

SPECIAL HOUSING ARRANGEMENTS

During periods when classes are not in session, housing is available and limited to those students with an extenuating need to remain on campus during the break period. Students who are permitted to stay must move to a floor or hall, which has been designated for break housing. Staff members are employed during this period to provide supervision. During this period building doors are locked 24 hours a day except the front door which is locked daily from 1:00 a.m. until 6:00 a.m.

SPECIAL SERVICES Special programs and services are available through the Residence Life and Housing Office, Ghering Health and Wellness Center and the Office of Student Affairs and Student Success. For information on these services, contact the appropriate office.

UNIVERSITY POLICIES Edinboro University has developed specific policies for Timely Warnings; Emergency Notifications; Missing Persons; and Emergency Operations and Evacuations. To access these policies, visit the Edinboro University home webpage at www.edinboro.edu. Click in the search field in the upper right, and keyword search "policies." In addition, the University Emergency response Guide can be accessed in the same search field by keyword searching "Emergency Response Guide."

Edinboro University recognizes its responsibility to comply with Act 73, "College and University Security Information Act" and the "Campus Security Act" or "Clery Act". Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act

Reportable Crime Definitions

Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter - The willful non-negligent killing of one human being by another.

Negligent Manslaughter - The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Sex Offenses Forcible - Any sex act directed against another person, forcibly and or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent. Specifically these offenses are: forcible rape, forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object and forcible fondling.

Sex Offenses Non-Forcible - Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse. Specifically these offenses are: incest and non-forcible statutory rape.

Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Burglary - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Arson - Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Uniform Crime Reporting Definitions - The Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program divides offenses

into two groups, Part I and Part II crimes. Each month contributing agencies submit information on the number of Part I offenses known to law enforcement; those offenses cleared by arrest or exceptional means; and the age, sex, and race of persons arrested for each of the offenses. Contributors provide only arrest data for Part II offense

The UCR Program collects data about **Part I** offenses in order to measure the level and scope of crime occurring throughout the nation. The Program's founders chose these offenses because they are serious crimes, they occur with regularity in all areas of the country, and they are likely to be reported to police.

The **Part I** offenses are:

Criminal homicide -a.) Murder and non-negligent manslaughter: the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths are excluded. The program classifies justifiable homicides separately and limits the definition to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; or (2) the killing of a felon, during the commission of a felony, by a private citizen. b.) Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence. Traffic fatalities are excluded.

Forcible rape -The carnal knowledge of a male or female forcibly and against their will. Rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Statutory offenses (no Force used -victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Robbery -The taking or attempted taking of anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

Burglary (breaking or entering) -The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted forcible entry is included.

Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft) -The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

Motor vehicle theft -The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on land surface and not on rails. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.

Arson -Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

The Part II offenses, for which only arrest data are collected, are:

Other assaults (simple) -Assaults and attempted assaults which are not of an aggravated nature and do not result in serious injury to the victim.

Forgery and counterfeiting -The altering, copying, or imitating of something, without authority or right, with the intent to deceive or defraud by passing the copy or thing altered or imitated as that which is original or genuine; or the selling, buying, or possession of an altered, copied, or imitated thing with the intent to deceive or defraud. Attempts are included.

Fraud -The intentional perversion of the truth for the purpose of inducing another person or other entity in reliance upon it to part with something of value or to surrender a legal right. Fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property by false pretenses, confidence games and bad checks, except forgeries and counterfeiting, are included.

Embezzlement -The unlawful misappropriation or misapplication by an offender to his/her own use or purpose of money, property, or some other thing of value entrusted to his/her care, custody, or control.

Stolen property; buying, receiving, possessing -Buying, receiving, possessing, selling, concealing, or transporting any property with the knowledge that it has been unlawfully taken, as by burglary, embezzlement, fraud, larceny, robbery, etc. Attempts are included.

Vandalism -To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law. Attempts are included.

Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc. -The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons. Attempts are included.

Prostitution and commercialized vice -The unlawful promotion of or participation in sexual activities for profit, including attempts.

Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice) -Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Attempts are included.

Drug abuse violations -The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The following drug categories are specified: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics - manufactured narcotics that can cause true addiction (Demerol, Methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (Barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Gambling -To unlawfully bet or wager money or something else of value; assist, promote, or operate a game of chance for money or some other stake; possess or transmit wagering information; manufacture, sell, purchase, possess, or transport gambling equipment, devices, or goods; or tamper with the outcome of a sporting event or contest to gain a gambling advantage.

Offenses against the family and children -Unlawful nonviolent acts by a family member (or legal guardian) that threaten the physical, mental, or economic well-being or morals of another family member and that are not classifiable as other offenses, such as Assault or Sex Offenses. Attempts are included.

Driving under the influence -Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

Liquor laws -The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. Federal violations are excluded.

Drunkenness -To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired. Excludes driving under the influence.

Disorderly conduct -Any behavior that tends to disturb the public peace or decorum, scandalizes the community, or shocks the public sense of morality.

Vagrancy -The violation of a court order, regulation, ordinance, or law requiring the withdrawal of persons from the streets or other specified areas; prohibiting persons from remaining in an area or place in an idle or aimless manner; or prohibiting persons from going from place to place without visible means of support.

All other offenses -All violations of state or local laws not specifically identified as Part I or Part II offenses, except traffic violations.

Note: Title 18 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes Defines Burglary as: Entering a building or occupied structure, or separately secured or occupied portion thereof, with intent to commit a crime therein, unless the premises are at the time open to the public, or the actor is licensed or privileged to enter.

Data obtained is from the 2007 Uniform Crime Report, "Crime in Pennsylvania." Some of these totals include incidents reported to other officials on campus which may not have been reported to and investigated by the Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Police. They may be higher than those reported by the University Police under the Uniform Crime Report.
